2021 has been a strange and complex year. Our access to relatively unrestricted regional arts activity was the envy of many and yet a growing uncertainty and exhaustion has led to a decline in the mental health of our sector and their communities.


Kaya noonacoort. In the face of this complexity and in a state as vast as ours, Regional Arts WA has focused efforts on bringing people together to share knowledge and support through peer networks and gatherings.

> We built on our Roundtable initiative, which started in 2020, regularly convening regional artists, organisations and Perth-based peak service organisations in a series of complementary meeting agendas to drive common advocacy goals and develop an agreed outcomes measurement framework. We also partnered with Healthway, Lotterywest and the Department of Local Government Sports and Cultural Industries to continue our Regional Online Chats; brought together peer groups such as our established Artist Fellows and the emerging Next Level recipients; provided financial support to ensure regional practitioners could attend events such as Artlands, the Indian Ocean Craft Triennial and Aboriginal Arts Centre Hub Western Australia's Our Business Forum; and consulted widely to develop four key tools to guide us for the next three years -Youth, Reconciliation, Decentralisation and Culturally and Linguistically

> Strengthening much of this work has been the growth of our Network of Regional Arts Hubs. Now covering eight of the nine regions, eight Hubs were hosted at Government House by our new patron His Excellency the Governor Kim Beazley who summed their work up nicely - "I have visited many regional communities and have been inspired by the impact arts initiatives make. Arts and culture are powerful. They can change lives".

Artists working regionally and responding to place is what drives this impact. The narratives that unravel from these artists' framing of the situations before them and their audiences' reception of their work generate a range of new perspectives, new meanings, and a sense of connectedness to their local communities. This has never been more important as we face an uncertain 2022 and hold our collective breath waiting for the full impact of opening our borders.

There have also been significant farewells this year. After 27 years, we said goodbye to our Shows on the Go program, and paid tribute to the hard work of the successive touring teams who delivered fantastic outcomes to regional and remote communities. We also extend a heartfelt thanks to Ted Snell as our outgoing Chair after leading us so capably during these troubled times.

Regional Arts WA has 437 members who are committed to supporting the strategic direction of the regional arts sector, and helping facilitate local governance events and activities.





Coordinate a multitude of networks and relationships

Regional Arts WA coordinated eight Roundtable discussions amongst individual regional artists, regional arts organisations, and Perth-based service organisations with regional programming. The Roundtables are a way to receive and share direct feedback and assist in developing a cohesive approach to collaborative thinking, long-term strategic planning, and stronger advocacy for regional arts.

Key outcomes which emerged from conversations were:

- An agreed Regional Arts Sector Outcomes Framework across the State
- Investigated best way to showcase regional artists in a festival model
- Better processes to coordinate regional workshops and training opportunities amongst service organisations
- · Commitment to First Nations knowledge and methodologies



Regional Arts Network



The Regional Arts Network is a collective of arts organisations from across regional and remote WA, who are committed to connecting communities locally and to reaching across the State to connect with other regions.

This year, the Network continued to strengthen its processes, took on exciting new projects, and grew to a total of ten members across eight regions.

The Network is an important addition to the State's cultural infrastructure and we appreciate the Minderoo Foundation, The Ian Potter Foundation and the Australian Government's Regional Arts Fund for recognising it as such.

NETWORK STRATEGY

As the roles and responsibilities of the Network members became more defined throughout the year, the Network collaborated to create three key strategic documents:

- 1. Deliverables Framework,
- 2. Terms of Reference; and
- 3. Strategic Plan

These documents enabled the Network to open membership to strategically aligned organisations who are willing to invest in being an active member of the Network.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE FUNCTION

Regional Arts WA's Patron, The Honourable Kim Beazley AC, Governor of Western Australia and Ms Annus hosted a Reception at Government House to celebrate the Regional Arts Network Initiative. It was a great opportunity for everyone who has been part of the initiative for the past two years to come together in person and be recognised for their hard work. It was also an opportunity to introduce the work of the Network to a wider audience.







Regional Arts Network

COLLABORATIVE PROJECTS

The Regional Arts Network worked with Dr. Shona Erskine to create a strategic plan directing the collective in its decision-making processes. The Network collaboratively works on a range of programs that are either co-designed or amplify an existing program by delivering it across the State.

The Network focused on the following programs this year:

Ebb+Flow

Ebb+Flow sees multi-artform creatives from each of the WA regions (including Perth) explore the theme of Ebb+Flow with the Carnamah community in the Mid West region.
Ebb+Flow has emerged from the Network Residency and Touring Program which was driven by Hub organisation, North Midlands Project, and now has been adopted by the Network.

The Network worked collectively to decide how they would celebrate the artists and build their professional capacity, resulting in the following:


- Teaming up with Broome artist and educator Jacky Cheng to create a series of videos about workshop facilitation.
 These videos are now available as a free resource to the wider arts sector
- Coordinating a series of stories written by Kalgoorlie artist
 SJ Eeles, highlighting each of the artists
- Investing in the artists' travel and freight expenses to participate in the residency

Creative Directory Platform

The Network decided to investigate the idea of a platform that showcases young creatives in the regions. Each of the Network identified one local young person to attend a series of four online sessions. Using the Creative Leadership Program tools, the sessions were co-facilitated by a young person and a Network representative, exploring the best way to showcase young regional artists digitally.

Creative Disability Access Program Resource

The Network is investigating a practical, up-to-date toolkit to assist the creative industry in making their programs and spaces accessible for people living with a disability.

Creative Leadership Program

Build existing strengths in skills and wellbeing



Regional Arts WA, through the Regional Arts Network Initiative, continued to collaborate with Dr. Shona Erskine to deliver a leadership program that is adaptable to all individuals and their community needs.

In partnership with the Regional Arts Network, the Creative Leadership Program is being delivered across regional Western Australia to help facilitate a culture of self-led leadership, collaborative leadership and community-led contribution.

The content is created from neuropsychology and neuroscience literature on creativity, and provides a robust framework for participants to enact creative practices, facilitate creative enterprises and become leaderful in the creative industries.

2022 will see the Creative Leadership Program continue to be delivered across regional WA and invite past participants to further their leadership journey with a new program.



Lotterywest Shows on the Go



After 27 years, Regional Arts WA has farewelled its beloved regional touring program, Shows on the Go.

Shows on the Go is a community-driven touring model giving regional Western Australians the chance to curate what shows they'd like to see in their town. The program has provided high-quality entertainment to local audiences and galvanised shared community experiences for over two decades.

Initiated by Regional Arts WA's change in strategic direction, the Minister for the Arts, the Hon David Templeman announced the transition of the program to CircuitWest, an exciting move that will ensure the further development of Shows on the Go.

Regional Arts WA hosted a wonderful celebration to mark the end of an era at the State Theatre Centre in November bringing together current and former regional presenters, past tour managers, tour coordinators, touring producers and many past and present Regional Arts WA staff and board.

Over the years, we have had an incredible run, touring 76 different shows to over 1,000 communities, with audiences of almost 150,000 people.

Regional Arts WA supported thirteen regional presenters, arts workers and artists to attend Showcase WA presented by CircuitWest, covering registration fees and travel costs to and from Perth.

It provided vital professional development opportunities and was an important opportunity to connect with other presenters and organisations to share experiences and plan for programming in the light of the pandemic. The seven regional artists, arts workers and presenters met with other presenters and producers from around the State. They saw and heard about WA-made work and considered options for presenting these shows in their local community. They learnt about critical arts management skills, including funding, community engagement, programming, and grant writing.

Additionally, Regional Arts WA hosted a networking event that brought together the conference attendees with other very experienced presenters and producers and other arts funding organisations.

Regional Arts and Cultural Investment Program

The Regional Arts and Cultural Investment Program (RACIP) is made possible by the State Government's Royalties for Regions Program.

Regional Arts and Cultural **Investment Program**

Regional Arts Sector Investment

Regional Arts WA supports regionally based arts and cultural organisations through the Regional Arts Sector Investment program (RASI).

15 diverse organisations from across the State receive multi-year funding to support the delivery of an annual program of activity between January 2021 and June 2023.

Funding is also provided to support one organisation in the Indian Ocean Territories through the Regional Arts Sector Investment program via an annual agreement with Federal and State Governments.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Theatre Kimberley | Kimberley

\$60,000 per year

Through COVID-19 impacting on touring, Theatre Kimberley reaped the benefits of six alumni and international circus artists staying in the community for an extended period. They provided professional development through the Train-the-Trainer intensive circus workshops and masterclasses for Sandfly Circus students and the general public, training in technical production for high school students and a number of specialty classes.

Denmark Arts Council | Great Southern

\$60,000 per year

Denmark Arts launched the inaugural Kwoorabup Writers Festival, delivered in partnership with Writers WA and facilitated the development and publication of an online edition of Westerley focusing entirely on Great Southern based writers.

Arts and Culture Christmas Island | Indian Ocean Territories*

With the construction of a nature playground featuring integrated artwork being a major focus in 2021, important partnerships have been developed with a wide range of local businesses, building social capital which will help when realising future public art projects.

Ku'arlu Mangga (Northampton Old School Initiative) | Mid West

\$45,000 per year

Despite receiving major damage to the venue through Tropical Cyclone Seroja, forcing studios to close, resident artists engaged in a range of creative development opportunities and workshops in printmaking, editioning and framing standards, supported through a Fremantle Arts Centre Revealed Mentorship and the Drug Aware YCulture program. They also ran their first online marketplace, with all paintings being sold.

Southern Edge Arts | Great Southern

\$35,000 per year

With a shift in focus to inter-generational projects, aiming to engage adults/ parents and young people through their programs, increasing opportunities for mentoring for young people, Southern Edge Arts premiered their musical theatre production, The Ballad of Penelope and Marlin, which was presented at the Albany Town Hall, employed 32 regional artists and arts workers, and reached an audience of 700.

Arts Narrogin | Wheatbelt

\$35,200 per year

Arts Narrogin continued to build community engagement through their performing arts program by adding value through social experiences for each show they presented and facilitating inclusive opportunities for hard-to-reach audiences in partnership with aged care providers. For seniors unable to attend the public performance, the cast from Miss Westralia performed songs from their production at a CWA catered morning tea and spent time discussing themes from the show and local connections.



The Junction Co | Pilbara

\$45,000 per year

The inaugural Pilbara Fashion Festival showcased 10 Pilbara based creative businesses and supported four to launch their labels nationally, with one subsequently picked up by the Darwin Art Fair and the Art of the Everyday Collection featuring in the opening events of the Indian Ocean Craft Triennial held in Perth in late 2021.

Wilurarra Creative | Goldfields-Esperance

\$41,135 per year

Presenting Straight Outta Wilurarra exhibition at the Cannery Arts Centre broadened Wilurarra's reach and developed a new partnership across the Goldfields Esperance region. Wilurarra Creative's Ngaanyatjarra Director, Brett Jennings and Wilurarra staff member and artist Adele Jennings opened the exhibition alongside Nyungar Tjaltjraak Elder Annie Dabb from Dabungool Cultural Experiences.

North Midlands Project | Mid West

\$44,000 per year

North Midlands Project hosted one of three Activating Collections residencies in regional WA. The residency took place in partnernship with the Carnamah Historical Society & Museum. It reactivated a disused portion of the heritagelisted Macpherson Homestead and resulted in an incredible range of workshops, community engagements and the creation of new body of locally meaningful work.

Esperance Community Arts | Goldfields-Esperance

\$35,000 per year

The Kaddatji Nyungar Boodja Plants and Culture Community Sculpture Project, run in conjunction with the Esperance Wildflower Festival, enabled community members to participate in constructing sculptures and dioramas depicting four plant species of cultural significance to the local Nyungar community, with a selection displayed at the Mandurah Performing Arts Centre as part of the National Conference for the Australian Association of Environmental Educators.

Southern Forest Arts | South West

\$24.597 per vear

Provided professional development for 40+ artists and curators through the regional Artists and Curators Symposium which was delivered in conjunction with John Curtin Gallery (JCG) and GalleriesWest and which complemented the 2017 Alternative Archive exhibition.

Cannery Arts Centre | Goldfields-Esperance

\$25,000 per year

Relaunched their Artist in Residence program which provided free accommodation for a number of Perth and regionally based artists who were supported to work on public art and music development projects in the community, through presenting a series of affordable workshops for school children and adults.

Gascoyne in May | Gascoyne

\$35.000 per year

Gascoyne in May undertook strategic planning and community consultation across the region, delivering their Heart of the Arts Gascoyne Arts Symposium, which was well represented by Gascoyne based arts organisations, local government officers, First Nations and local artists who travelled from each of the five other towns within the region to attend the two day event held in Carnaryon.

Rave About Arts (formerly Ravensthorpe Regional Arts Council) **Goldfields-Esperance**

\$35,000 per year

Annette Carmichael Project's The Beauty Index - Dance by Ordinary Men doing Extraordinary Things engaged 12 local men in a deeply enriching contemporary dance experience, strengthening the community through new friendships and exposing the very appreciative audience of over 200 to a new and unique performing arts experience.

Beverley Station Arts | Wheatbelt

\$15,000 per year


Beverley Station Arts' engagement with their local community expanded during 2021 and they saw the highest number of artworks ever entered into their annual visual arts community exhibition, and high attendances for all events presented at the Platform Theatre seeing the Beverley Station Arts make a profit overall on events for the first time in many years.

ArtSouth WA | Great Southern

\$15,000 per year

The inaugural inclusion of ten schools into the 2021 Southern Art and Craft Trail, developed partnerships between retailers, schools and ArtSouthWA resulting in community exhibitions being presented in prominent main street and hospitality venues and boosting publicity for the Trail. Participating schools have indicated their interest in continuing with the project into 2022.

Regional Artist Fellowships

For a second year, the Regional Artist Fellowship program supported four established artists and arts workers with grants of \$50,000 over two years to undertake a self-directed program of creative activity and professional development which builds their capacity to sustain a career in regional WA.

RECIPIENTS

Abdul Rahaman Abdullah | Mardella

Abdul Rahaman Abdullah is a visual artist based in the Peel region, whose Fellowship project, Keluarga (Family) - A Shared Story, develops and expands on the creative role of family within his artistic practice. Abdul is undertaking a series of collaborative projects with artist partners including brother Abdul Abdullah, wife Anna Louise Richardson and Great Southern based mother/daughter duo Golden Wattle Hookers, for different exhibition outcomes in Perth, Melbourne, Newcastle, Bowral, and Fremantle. Related projects explore different perspectives of cultural geography, bringing together sculpture, painting and drawing within immersive installation experiences.

Adelina Adrianna Larsson Mendoza | Margaret River

Choreographer and culturally and linguistically diverse (CaLD) artist Adelina Adrianna Larsson Mendoza is developing an original choreographic solo work in collaboration with four regional CaLD artists to create Min Folkdans (My Folk Dance), a work which explores diaspora, identity and new cultural myths. Over the course of her Fellowship she is also facilitating an accompanying community project, Din Folkdans (Your Folk Dance) that aims to promote cultural rights and visibility for the regional multicultural community. Through the development of Din Folkdans, Adelina aims to develop and deepen her artistic intentions within a social arts paradigm that drives social change and promotes skill-development for young CaLD participants in the South West.

Annette Carmichael | Denmark

Annette Carmichael is a choreographer and creative producer with a track record in devising and developing multi-artform contemporary dance performances with community. Through this Fellowship she aims to publish a book which enhances a broader understanding of the value of the arts to regional communities. The book focuses on the stories and research attached to The Beauty Index, a men's dance project created with communities of men in regional WA, 2017-2021. Annette is also building her capacity in public speaking through a mentorship program and develop a series of scripts for keynote addresses for presentation to non-arts sector audiences and public sector conferences.

Chloe Flockart | Merredin

Chloe Flockart is a theatre practitioner and puppet maker based in Merredin, who through this Fellowship will undertake a two-year practice transition from venue and theatre based artforms, to developing and presenting visual theatre in public spaces facilitated through projection mapping technology. Chloe is undergoing mentoring with projection company Illuminart and Lewis Horne, and working with Meridian Regional Arts Inc to deliver two projection mapping projects within the Shire of Merredin.

Regional Participation Grants

With State Government support, through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC), Regional Arts WA supported a range of regional practitioners to attend key professional development opportunities.



Regional Arts WA supported regional artists, arts workers, and craft practitioners to attend the inaugural Indian Ocean Craft Triennial (IOTA21) opening events, which included the Futuring Craft conference, and Curiosity and Cloth fashion events held in Perth during September.

Small competitive grants of up to \$1,000 were provided to assist with costs associated with travel, accommodation, and registration fees. Regional Arts WA also hosted a networking event for all regional attendees to the IOTA conference, facilitating an opportunity for intraregional networking.

Project Grants

Project Grants are a stream of the Regional Arts Fund designed to support arts projects, professional development for artists and arts workers, and community capacity building projects for regional artists and communities.

Successful projects encourage sustainable economic, social and cultural outcomes, encourage partnerships, networks, and ongoing collaboration, develop audiences and broaden community engagement with the arts, raise the profile of regional and remote artists and support quality and viability of artistic and cultural activity.

View from the Magpie's Nest (Toodyay) | \$30,000

View from the Magpie's Nest is a community singing, storytelling and interdisciplinary arts project exploring identity and the concept of home, inspired by the metaphor of the magpie's nest. The project will deliver a range of multi-artform workshops in Toodyay, which aim to upskill participants of all ages, awaken creativity, and promote social cohesion, resulting in a final mass performance bringing participants and audiences together in shared experience.

Camera Story | Kimberley

Exposure 3: New Voices in WA Photography | \$30,000

Exposure is a long-term photo media initiative created by Yamatji, Nyoongar curator Glenn Iseger-Pilkington and Perth Centre of Photography. It empowers First Nations artists with opportunities to voice their stories and lived experiences through photography. This phase of the project will concentrate on expanding the availability of quality education, increase access to resources within the community and provide mentorships for four First Nations artists from the Kimberley region.

Southern Forest Arts | South West

Mycelium (Stage 3) | \$30,000

Mycelium is a connection and collaboration project within WA's regional art sector. Southern Forest Arts will present a series of 16 mentorships for regional curators and producers in 9 regions over 12 months to build capacity in the sector towards supporting the presentation of a future Regional Arts Triennial.



Waringarri Aboriginal Arts | Kimberley

Planting Knowledge | \$29,813

Planting Knowledge draws inspiration from traditional knowledge of plants and delivers a creative development framework for the next generation of artists and arts workers. The project aims to strengthen cultural knowledge, extend professional arts practice through creative experimentation and develop conceptual and technical skills in the production of new cultural expressions for physical and virtual exhibitions and multi-disciplinary site-specific installation.

Miranda Plum | Gascovne

Street Art Mentorship Carnarvon | \$15,000

Miranda Plum undertook a mentorship with experienced mural artist, Sobrane Simcock where Miranda designed and created three public murals in prominent locations around Carnarvon. Featuring local flora and fauna, the murals aim to share the region's richness with visitors and contribute to the enhancement of public space.

Tony Windberg | South West

Wonders of the Worlds Project - Phase 2: Artwork Creation and Exhibition \$15,000

Tony Windberg will create a new body of work which addresses contemporary environmental and societal concerns through an examination of the rise and fall of empires. This work will be presented in a major exhibition, supported by a program of workshops and artist talks, planned for June 2022 at the Bunbury Regional Art Gallery.

Bethamy Linton | Gidgegannup

Birds rained from the sky | \$14,890

Bethamy Linton will make a series of small sculptures in titanium lace and silver depicting the skull casings of native animals impacted by the February 2021 bushfires. In the tradition of objects of mourning, the sculptures will be imagined artefacts of a crumbling civilisation, referencing and evoking the experience of people in the community, highlighting the effect of climate change and dehabitation. Documented in film and photography, the project will commence July 2021 and the work exhibited in the latter half of 2022.

Christopher Hill | Kimberley

Dinosaur Stomp | \$14.800

Dinosaur Stomp was a collaboration between artists and scientists to create earth shaking, fun making, bone rattling, in your face street puppets. The street puppets were created to educate people about the many species of dinosaur that frequented the coast near Broome about 129 million years ago.

We Must Get Together Sometime | \$14,130

Award winning poet Nandi Chinna created a suite of poetry responding to Martuwarra (the Fitzroy River) in consultation with Niyikina Traditional Custodian Dr Anne Poelina. This work forms Chinna's contribution to a collaboration with internationally recognised textile artist Jane Donlin for the We Must Get Together Sometime, agroup exhibition that was a part of the inaugural Indian Ocean Craft

Sarah-Javne Eeles | Goldfields-Esperance

Geraldton Historical Ghost Walks | \$13,307

Sarah Jayne-Eales will develop and present a series of performance-based historical and cultural tours, which will be developed from true stories drawn from the community and will result in audiences and visitors experiencing the history of Geraldton in a unique way.

Albany String Festival auspiced by Albany Sinfonia Incorporated | Great Southern

Albany String Festival | \$7,593

The Albany String Festival presented a series of performance events and workshops in October 2021 in association with the Australian renowned Darlington String Quartet. The festival aimed to engage and inspire young string players at the commencement of their string studies, emerging artists considering careers in the music industry, string teachers and community musicians.

Astrid Volzke | Wheatbelt

From the Locals | \$6.068

Astrid Volzke presented a series of inclusive photography workshops in Kondinin, inviting community members of all ages to look at their town in a new light where they captured a series of images to tell a story about their community. The project culminated in a community screening.

Rita Bush | Great Southern

inSPACE Award Residency | \$4.934

Dance artist Rita Bush and co-director Cayleigh Davies undertook an Award Residency through the expansion of a creative team and the inclusion of lighting designer Susan Grey-Gardner, which enabled them to expand existing work to a full-length dance performance suitable for touring.

Regional Arts Fund

Quick Response Grants

Quick Response Grants provide support for regional artists, arts organisations and communities to take advantage of professional development or small-scale project opportunities that arise at short notice and where the activity is unable to be planned for or supported by other funding programs.

From July, the Quick Response Grants program has been delivered in distinct monthly rounds. Applicants were eligible to receive one Quick Response Grant during each financial year with \$3,000 available for individuals and \$5,000 for organisations.

North Midlands Project partnered with the Carnamah Historical Society to transform an agricultural-themed board game from a regional WA collection into a large community artwork which engaged their local community in cultural activities for World Heritage Day.

The Junction Co | \$4,000 | Pilbara

The Junction Co received funding to create a short video documenting skilled Aboriginal dancer Tara Gower's dynamic dance performance featuring garments from the Indigenous fashion and jewellery collection The Art of the Everyday, originally developed for the Pilbara Fashion Festival.

Dowerin Community Resource Centre | \$4,000 | Wheatbelt

The Dowerin Community Resource Centre and the Shire of Dowerin collaborated to present the Dowerin Do-Over, part conference, part hands-on placemaking and mural project which included interactive activities and projects along Dowerin's main street.

Broome CIRCLE | \$4,000 | Kimberley

Broome CIRCLE was able to extend their Broome based photography partnership with Camera Story to engage women in the remote community of Bidyadanga. The workshops covered creative development and technical production, with participants working towards the presentation of an exhibition.

Eleanor Davies | \$1,625 | South West

Eleanor Davies was supported to work with writer and actress Ngaire Pigram, to finalise the development of the tragicomedy script Servo, a multi-artform performance including dance, clowning, circus and theatre, which was then pitched to regional presenters at the 2021 CircuitWest Showcase.

Jacky Cheng | \$1,625 | Kimberley

Jacky Cheng was invited to Artlands 2021, the national regional arts conference, to present a Short and Sweet presentation about her experience as a regionally based culturally and linguistically diverse artist and how it informs her practice. Funding was provided to assist with travel and accommodation to attend the WA Artands Hub in Karratha.

Martumili Artists (Shire of East Pilbara) | \$3,500 | Pilbara

A group of Martumili Artists were supported to travel to the WA Artlands 2021 hub in Karratha to present the story behind a large-scale collaborative canvas that they painted over the course of a year which references Waturarra/ Wardurarra (or Kintyre), part of Martu Country at the centre of a Martu campaign against uranium mining.

Felicity Brown was supported to develop a flamboyant, bling and glittered showcase collection of 20 pieces of millinery for the All that Glitters event which was presented at the 2021 Broome Mardi Gras Pride Festival.

Rose Barton | \$3,000 | Pilbara

Young and emerging curator Rose Barton, was supported to work with mentor Ted Snell to curate the next iteration of HERENOW in November 2021. The exhibition focused on the contemporary exploration of traditional craftbased mediums, and provoked dialogue on the role of craft in environmental, socioeconomics and cultural healing.

Neil Turner | \$2.956 | Goldfields-Esperance

The people of remote First Nations community Cosmo Newberry (Ýilka) invited master woodworker Neil Turner to provide a series of workshops working with locally grown sandalwood and Indigenous timbers. Funds were used to purchase specialised tools providing safe and effective methods in timber carving for all levels of experience.

Shire of Broome | \$2,044 | Kimberley

The Shire of Broome and Shinju Matsuri Festival received funding to support artist fees for a commemorative multicultural event celebrating the rise of the full moon and the newly erected public artwork titled Fusion in Chinatown, Broome.



Denmark Baroque Inc | \$1,600 | Great Southern

Denmark Baroque received support for the professional presentation of Henry Purcell's semi-opera The Fairy Queen. The performance was part of a project involving a community choir and orchestra and was supported by an early music specialist music director, soloists from Perth and Melbourne and a professional string quartet. Grant funding was used to support professional fees for regionally based musicians and quality lighting design.

Alisa Blakeney | \$2,500 | South West

Curator and digital artist Alisa Blakeney collaborated with New South Wales based artist Tina Stefanou to translate the participatory vocal work; The Longest Hum into an interactive digital platform to be presented in an online iteration of the Cementa21 festival in Kandos, NSW. Cementa21 was re-programmed at short notice into an online experience due to COVID impacts.

Robert Castiglione | \$3,000 | Great Southern

Award winning documentary maker Robert Castiglioni was supported to produce a short documentary about La Traviata (The Fallen Woman), a community capacity building and professional development opera project produced by Jenna Robertson in collaboration with the Albany community. The documentary will be pitched for presentation at film festivals to share the story behind La Traviata with new audiences.

Kerry Juhren | \$1,000 | Wheatbelt

Kerry Juhren was selected to present her work as part of the Perth 2021 Art Upmarket exhibition, which will increase her profile and expose her work to new audiences and markets. Funds were provided to support the professional display of her work and marketing.

Rose Bennett | \$3,000 | South West

Young author and publisher Rose Bennet was assisted with the costs relating to professional editing, cover-design, publication, and promotion of her sequel to Maya of the In-Between, the first in a series of novels aimed at young audiences published in 2020.

Ku'arlu Mangga (Good Nest) | \$5,000 | Mid West

Ku'arlu Mangga (Good Nest) was supported to collaborate with Eco Fashion WA Coordinator Zuhal Kuvan-Mills on a promotional photoshoot which provided their designers with a unique opportunity to have their textile range photographed and modelled. The project will culminate in a new design portfolio for a series of events in 2022.

Kimberley based artist Jacky Cheng was invited to undertake a residency at Fremantle Arts Centre to continue her work with Kozo paper and explore the potential for weaving the threads using hand crafted processes to create a Qi Pao; a high necked costume of Manchu Origin.

Emily Barker | \$3,000 | South West

Recently returned from the United Kingdom, Australian artist Emily Barker will tour the South West and the Eastern States performing songs from her new album, A Dark Murmuration of Words, which reckons with the emotional fallout and impacts of the climate crisis.

Regional Arts Fund

Artlands Participation Grants

Through Regional Arts Australia, Regional Arts WA was able to support 11 arts workers and artists to attend Artlands, a national regional arts conference. Attendees discovered new ideas and emerging trends, and connected with the creative and cultural sector across regional, rural and remote Australia.

Artlands 2021 was delivered by Regional Arts Australia through a hybrid model due to the impacts of various lockdowns and restrictions limiting movement across State and Territory borders.

Attendees were either supported to travel to the WA Artlands Hub hosted by the Red Earth Arts Precinct in Karratha or to register for a digital ticket to access live streamed content from the various participating centres from across the country.

Regional Arts Fund Recovery Boost

The Recovery Boost was a targeted measure announced by the Australian Government in 2020. The program responded to the impact of COVID-19 on the regional arts sector.

This year, the investment provided support through the following programs:

- Renewal Grants
- · Annual Event Fund

The Regional Arts Fund is an Australian Government program that supports and promotes participation in, and access to, Australia's arts and culture in regional, rural and remote Australia. The program is managed by Regional Arts Australia and administered in Western Australia by Regional Arts WA.







Renewal Grants

Renewal Grants provided up to three years of funding to support strategic projects that demonstrated strong partnerships and long-term outcomes, with sustainable future-positioning focus. Applicants were encouraged to present proposals that were process driven, had a focus on renewed arts practice and learning processes for First Nations Worker positions.

Applications to the Renewal Program were assessed initially through an Expression of Interest process and reviewed internally by Regional Arts WA staff, with projects deemed to meet the criteria of the program then invited to submit a full application for assessment through an external peer panel.

Of the four projects funded, three supported First Nations led renewal across the remote Kimberley region with the fourth project providing training and employment of regional producers.

Warlayirti Artists Aboriginal Corporation | Halls Creek - Kimberley \$90.000 over 3 years

Warlayirti Aboriginal Corporation will employ a Cultural Coordinator, aimed at profoundly shaping the future of Warlayirti Artists and revitalising the artistic and cultural heritage of Balgo, Australia's most linguistically and culturally diverse Aboriginal community. The Cultural Coordinator will focus on intergenerational transfer of knowledge through weekly On-Country trips with young people and Elders, coordinating Arts Workers to revive the already established Culture Centre, and to work directly with community service providers.

Theatre Kimberley | Broome - Kimberley

\$80,000 over 3 years

Broome based performing arts organisation Theatre Kimberley have been supported to employ a First Nations Cultural Worker as part of their Creating Stronger Ways program. The program aims to strengthen the company's crosscultural practices, building capacity and knowledge within the organisation and improve their connection to and engagement with First Nations communities in the Kimberley.

Kimberley Aboriginal Law and Cultural Centre | Derby - Kimberley \$90,000 over 3 years

Renewal funding supports Kimberley Aboriginal Women through coordinated business development and an intergenerational artistic skill and cultural knowledge sharing and exchange program. Outcomes were presented at the 2021 Regional Cultural Festival and will be embedded into subsequent annual gatherings and is part of a broader strategy to increase support for women's cultural agendas.

Annette Carmichael Projects | Denmark - Great Southern \$90,000 over 3 years

Annette Carmichael Projects will develop and deliver a training and employment program for regional producers, embedded within the creation of a new multisited and multi-artform performance work which will premiere in five regional communities in 2023 as part of the 2023 Perth Festival and co-presented by STRUT Dance.

The York Festival | \$32,838 over two years

The York Festival is a multi-arts, family-friendly event that celebrates its location in the West Australian Wheatbelt through a program of music, theatre, performance, exhibitions, workshops, language and culture. 2021 saw the reprisal of the famous York Jazz Festival, the launch of a new Writer's Festival, a celebration of continuing Balardong Noongar Culture and a feast of Rare & Endangered Crafts in and around York's beautiful heritage buildings.

Nannup Music Club | South West

Nannup Music Festival | \$75.000 over three years

The annual Nannup Music Festival presents an eclectic mix of acts over the March long weekend, highlighting the best in new, emerging and Indigenous original music. The awarded community-spirit event creates exposure opportunities for artists and invites everyone to share, discover and immerse themselves in a weekend of music, activities, camping, food and artisan markets. Between 2022 and 2024 Nannup Music Festival will focus on developing their new premises and broadening their artistic program through arts sector and industry partnerships.

Esperance Community Arts | Goldfields-Esperance

Esperance Wildflower Festival | \$75,000 over three years

The Esperance Wildflower Festival is an annual five-day artistic and cultural heritage festival celebrating the diversity of native flora from the region. In 2021 the festival focused on strengthening partnerships with the First Nations community, cultural knowledge exchange and education, increasing social cohesion, environmental sustainability and increasing community participation in the arts through the development of interactive public sculptures and a range of performances and community events.

Country Music Club of Boyup Brook WA | South West

Boyup Brook Country Music Festival | \$75,000 over three years

The Boyup Brook Country Music Festival is an iconic West Australian event supporting grassroots regional arts and culture. A significant part of the local DNA but with a national reach, the Boyup Brook Country Music Festival provides opportunities for artist development, networking and performance. Between 2022 and 2024 the Festival will provide enhanced opportunities for young people and increase engagement with First Nations artists and communities.

Denmark Arts Council | Great Southern

Denmark Festival of Voice | \$75,000 over three years

The Denmark Festival of Voice offers an original, diverse and authentic program of concerts, workshops and panel discussions in celebration of the power and beauty of the human voice. Local and international acts will present music, language and story to audiences across eight intimate venues for three days over the WA Day long weekend in early June. Between 2022 and 2024 the Denmark Festival of Voice will focus on increasing engagement with children and young people and building capacity and skills for volunteers and arts-workers.

Investment Pool

The majority of Regional Arts WA grant programs are peer assessed by an independent, external sub-committee of artists and cultural workers from across WA.

The Investment Pool is a group of individuals who are called upon to assess funding applications. For each round of assessments, an Investment Sub-Committee is formed from members of the Pool, based on each person's area of expertise and overall regional spread.

The Investment Pool aims to be broadly representative of regional Western Australian arts practitioners, art forms, arts organisations, producers, presenters and communities. The majority of members are drawn from regional or remote areas and includes representation from First Nations and Culturally and Linguistically Diverse communities and young people.

Advocacy

Our 2021 advocacy program was once again interrupted by COVID-19, but in between lockdowns and the announcement of the Governor as our Patron, some important regional field trips were undertaken.

As a result of the State election, a number of new regional sitting members began their Parliamentary career. Trips to the Great Southern, Goldfields-Esperance, Peel and the South West saw the CEO meet with six new Members of the Legislative Council, introducing them to local practitioners in their electorates and demonstrating the value of the funding provided by the State Government through the Regional Arts and Culture Investment Program.

Regional visits to assist Hubs in their relationships with local government authorities focused on the Great Southern and the Pilbara, with joint meetings held with five Shire representatives and two Development Commissions.

After consultancy with the sector, our meetings with Minister Templeman this year focused on the need for longer term arts and cultural planning at a government level. Concerns over a reliance on short term project funding, the disappearance of the arts from the regional education sector and the difficulties faced by emerging young artists were raised as key ongoing issues.

We continued to work closely with our interstate colleagues and Regional Arts Australia, successfully negotiating a new six year agreement to deliver the Regional Arts Fund and securing an extra \$5 million nationally to boost the cultural tourism aspects of regional arts activities.

The release of the Federal Parliamentary Report Sculpting A National Cultural Plan late in the year has added timely bi-partisan recommendations to prosecute in the lead up to the Federal election in 2022.

Field Trips




Field Trips became a focus, as travel restrictions eased throughout the year. Staff visited nine regions, despite a number of cancelled and rescheduled plans due to COVID-19. They met with arts workers, artists and local governments, and participated in local arts events in the regions.

Highlights included a trip to the South West, where the team were able to celebrate the last Shows on the Go tour with the Harvey community. Investment Coordinator Amber Launay visited and met with several Regional Arts Sector Investment organisations including Gascoyne in May, Esperance Community Arts, The Cannery Arts Centre, and Ravensthorpe Regional Arts Council.

CEO Paul MacPhail continued to connect artists and arts workers with their local key decision makers in the regions with visits to Pinjarra, Albany, Newman, Port Hedland, Karratha, Denmark, and York. He spoke with Dawesville MLA Lisa Munday, Murray-Wellington MLA Robyn Clarke, Albany MLA Rebecca Stephens, and Collie-Preston MLA Jodie Hanns to discuss the state of the regional arts sector, advocate for a further 4 years of funding of Regional Arts and Culture Investment Program, and a different distribution model to ensure a higher proportion of funds go to regional communities.

A number of staff also attended the national Artlands conference through one of the satellite hubs in Karratha. They connected with local delegates and gained a broader knowledge of what is happening in the arts sector at a national scale. Network Coordinator Gemma Robbins presented on the Regional Arts Network at the conference.

The Artist of the Month program puts a spotlight on regionally based creatives to highlight some of the amazing talent that can be found across the State.

Artists self-nominate or are invited to be profiled as part of the program. Featured artists are interviewed for their story that is published on the Regional Arts WA website and distributed in our eNews. Artists are promoted throughout Regional Arts WA's social media platforms and through possible media opportunities in digital, print and radio.

As well as providing an audience to which to showcase their work, the Artist of the Month program supports artists to hone their skills in promotional planning and curation of their media profile.



The artists and organisations featured were:

January | Karen Chappelow | Wheatbelt

Karen Chappelow is a sculptor and painter from Moondyne. Her whimsical style of expressionism-distortion has built her a network of collectors around the world.

February | Jacky Cheng | Kimberley

Jacky Cheng was born in Malaysia and found her voice in visual arts. Now based in Broome, her paper art explores identity and awareness through cultural activities and memories of home, country, and relationships.

March | Wilurarra Creative | Goldfields-Esperance

Wilurarra Creative's home of Warburton Community, on the Ngaanyatjarra Lands, is one of the most remote areas of Australia. With an arts space, library, hair salon, music studio, and workshop, the community is full of creative people participating in a range of programs.

April | George Corke | Great Southern

Mount Barker artist George Corke creates one-of-a-kind furniture and sculptures out of timber and metal from his studio, Corkescrew Gallery and Workshop.

May | Sita Bennett | South West

Sita Bennett is a young writer, actor, and filmmaker based in Margaret River who has recently published her first adult fantasy novel. She has plans to continue the series, with the sequel underway.

June | Abdul-Rahman Abdullah | Peel

Abdul-Rahman Abdullah shares his cross-cultural perspective through sculpture and installation art. Working from a farm in Mundijong, he has been exhibited widely across Australia.

July | Bianca Long | Kimberley

Djaru woman Bianca Long is a visual artist living in Wyndham. She explores her connection with Country through her paintings, which she has recently turned into textiles to start her own fashion line – Jaru Girl.

August | Jess Hadden | Gascoyne

Photographer and videographer Jess Hadden has been capturing images of the Ningaloo Coast and its megafauna for eleven years. He has recently opened a gallery in Exmouth with fellow artist Sadie James to exhibit and sell his awardwinning works.

September | Cindy Poole | Goldfields-Esperance

Cindy Poole has been operating her Esperance glass gallery and workshop for more than 25 years. Taking a zero-waste approach to glass art, she creates home décor, wearable art, sculptural, and functional pieces from recycled glass bottles.

October | Joshua Brew | Peel

Mandurah-based JOSHUA, a mononym of singer/songwriter and producer Joshua Brew, recently debuted his first EP Albany, inspired by his time living and working in the Great Southern.

November | Christopher Young | South West

Margaret River artist Christopher Young explores themes of isolation, connection, and identity in his photo media work. Recently he has started working with oral histories and virtual reality experiences.

December | Country Music Club of Boyup Brook | South West

For 36 years, local musicians have performed at the Boyup Brook Country Music Festival alongside some of the country's biggest live music acts. Each year the festival is organised by volunteers and committee members from the Country Music Club of Boyup Brook.

Siobhan Kelley is a virtual artist who spent eight months escaping COVID-19 while travelling from Victoria to New South Wales to Queensland, and eventually to Port Hedland. With teenage children and a husband working interstate, her everyday home life is constantly busy – a contrast to her experience working alone during her Ebb+Flow residency.

Crystal Stacey | Kimberley

After an accident left her with two broken bones in her right arm, Crystal Stacey's Ebb+Flow residency was a time of healing, allowing her to reconnect with her practice.

SJ Eeles | Goldfields-Esperance

Regional WA interviewer and copywriter SJ Eeles sat down with author and creative SJ Eeles (a mirror may have been involved) to find out a little more about this WA emerging writer and regional creative producer.

Local writers' group, Scribes of North Midlands, were also given an opportunity to write a story about one of the artists.

Mikaela Castledine | Perth

Sector Outcomes

Festival Consultation

We continued our journey to better demonstrate the impact of our regional arts sector and improve the way we talk about our work, its importance, and its positive effect on regional communities.

Regional Arts WA entered into a three-year developmental partnership with the Cultural Development Network, and began to adopt outcomes across five policy domains; cultural, governance, economic, social, and environmental. These outcome statements have been drawn from extensive research by the Cultural Development Network and are being explored by Regional Arts WA with as many regional artists and arts workers as possible.

From May to October, five regional independent practitioners and organisations were invited to pilot the Cultural Development Network's outcomes management system, Takso, which is in its early stages of development. The participants were asked to design and evaluate one of their upcoming programs or projects within Takso and provide feedback on their experience for use in the arts sector.

All participants saw value in using Takso and evidence-based planning. Findings from the Pilot will be used to inform future developments of Takso as we move into the next phase of our partnership with the Cultural Development Network.

"I feel everyone should make a Takso plan before going ahead with a grant application. As this whole process made me realise all the holes in my application."

For years, Regional Arts WA has heard of the sector's desire for a festival that celebrates regional artists. Previously, we have investigated this through our monthly survey, which produced mixed results. Using the World Café methodology, we delved into this idea a little deeper.

Several World Café sessions were conducted virtually and face-to-face, generating 75 different conversations with 81 participants across the ten regions, including Perth.

The major ideas that emerged were:

- The notion of competitions that resulted in an acknowledgment, award and/or prize. This topic appeared in over half of the conversations with several groups highlighting prizes and awards already in place in the sector.
- Over 65% of conversations clearly indicated regional artists and their work should be showcased online/virtually. A high number of those conversations discussed the benefits and opportunities including reaching new audiences, online marketplaces, digital performances etc.
- The most mentioned ideas of what a successful festival for regional artists look like included local community involvement and that it occurs in multiple locations.

Regional Arts WA will be looking to these findings, and other research, to determine the model for an ongoing event to celebrate the regional arts sector.

Our Diversity and Inclusion Plans

Regional Arts WA is committed to embedding equity, diversity, and inclusion across all our services, programs and activities.

The Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Working Party has developed a policy which enables Regional Arts WA to make some real, sustainable, and accelerated change within the resources available, in the following areas: age, cultural and linguistic diversity (CaLD).



Our Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CaLD) Inclusion Action Plan was created in consultation with CaLD artists working and living in regional Western Australia. It aims to increase the accessibility of Regional Arts WA programs, services, and activities to artists and practitioners who identify as CaLD, by achieving the following goals by the end of 2023:

CaLD Inclusion Action Plan

- 1. Increase Participation and Representation: Artists and practitioners who identify as CaLD do not see themselves in the regional arts sector. Regional Arts WA will ensure there is an increase in representation across all activities by people who identify as CaLD.
- 2. Use Accessible Language: Words are difficult to interpret when English is not your first language. Language which is accessible and concise will support artists and practitioners who identify as CaLD to understand and translate information. Regional Arts WA will use accessible language throughout its services.
- 3. Provide Support Networks: A network of artists and practitioners who identify as CaLD is necessary to help navigate the arts sector. Having people who have similar lived experiences available to answer questions will encourage confidence. Regional Arts WA will provide CaLD support networks across services.

Our Youth Inclusion Action Plan was created in conjunction with the Youth Sub-Committee comprised of Kellee Aberg, Grace Crogan, Minna Hilton, Clea Purvis, Hanna Spencer, and Jessikah Woods. It aims to increase the accessibility of Regional Arts WA programs, services, and activities to young people, aged 18-26 years, by achieving the following goals by the end of 2023:

- 1. Provide Peer Support: The availability and access to mentors or skilled peers is important for young people in growing their careers in the arts sector. Having someone available to answer questions and lend a helping hand will build experience and confidence. Regional Arts WA will provide support across services.
- 2. Use Plain English: Knowledge of arts terms, language and acronyms is a barrier for young people who are starting out their arts journey. Regional Arts WA will use plain English which is clear and simple throughout its services.
- 3. Provide Case Studies: Many young people acknowledge they have limited knowledge and experience after completing high school. It is daunting for a young person to step into the arts sector without information of what is expected from them, what success looks like, and how to achieve goals without a how-to guide or roadmap. Regional Arts WA will provide case studies across services to increase understanding.

YCulture Regional

Drug Aware YCulture Regional

A funding and development program for youth arts and culture projects developed by young people aged 12 to 26 years, living in regional WA. The program is open for all art forms and is supported by Healthway to promote the Drug Aware message through these creative projects.

Young people participated in a series of action sports videography and photography workshops with artist Jakob Wells, where they developed skills in filming and editing with different types of cameras, followed by a community screening of the videos. It was also an opportunity for them to learn about the different career prospects in screen production and action sports.

Drug Aware Fusion on the Green

Young people in Waroona came together for the Drug Aware Fusion on the Green event where they enjoyed a variety of interactive activities and entertainment. They participated in numerous workshops including a drumming circle, an Aboriginal art project facilitated by Bindjareb Middars, and breakdancing sessions. Various community services took part in the event including GP Down South and Nidjalla Waangan Mia.

Nannup Youth Week Circus Workshop 2021

Coordinated by Isobel Hamilton and Jorja Rice \$4,000 | South West | Auspiced by Shire of Nannup

Young people in Nannup participated in circus workshops ran by NeuroCircus over four days. Participants developed trapeze, juggling, hula hoops, aerials, slap stick and diabolo skills in both youth circus and performance. The workshops culminated in a performance for family, friends, and the Nannup community, and were part of Youth Week activities.





Pinjarra Senior High School Project presented by Drug Aware

Coordinated by Danica Old and Cole Agnew \$4,000 | Peel | Auspiced by Rotary Club of Pinjarra

Young people in Pinjarra collaborated with artist Daniel Smith on a mural project where they incorporated their new school house system, Earth, Scarp, Forest, Towns and River, and the Indigenous names for those into the artwork. Participants developed skills in how to use spray paint art equipment safely, and techniques on how to make the artwork more realistic. The unveiling of the mural coincided with the Pinjarra Festival.

Inspiration Studio by Drug Aware

Several art workshops were held for young people, where they developed a variety of new skills including abstract photography, detailed editing of black and white photographs, acrylic pouring techniques and how to make sculptures out of scrap metal. The workshops culminated in an art exhibition of the work created during for family, friends, and the wider community of Narembeen.

Avon Valley Drug Aware Dry Art Workshop & Exhibition

Young people in Northam participated in a series of dry art workshops with artist Lorraine Pichugin. The workshops culminated in an exhibition at the AVAS Arts Centre of the art works created by the participants.

Teenagers Drug Awareness Art Day

Young people in Cunderdin and surrounding Wheatbelt towns participated in an art day with artists Olivia Ryan and Jaclyn Peach. Participants developed skills in paint pouring, step by step canvas painting, different paint techniques and colour mixing. The artworks created were displayed at a community event.

Potluck at Nine: Presented by Drug Aware

Coordinated by Emily Burton and George Burton \$4,000 | Peel | Auspiced by All The Ways Theatre Company

Young people in Mandurah will participate in the remount and redevelopment of contemporary theatre show Potluck at Nine. Project Coordinators will be mentored by Yvette Wall to further develop their skills in directing and cast members will have the opportunity to develop skills in character building, layering intention, physical movement, projection, and working as an ensemble, A performance of Potluck at Nine will be showcased in Mandurah in mid-January

Mural on Jetty Road presented by Drug Aware

Coordinated by Kassidy Lewis and Samantha Billington \$4,000 | South West | Auspiced by Bunbury Senior High School Parents and **Community Association**

Young people in Bunbury were mentored by mural artist Andrew Frazer, where they participated in a series of workshops before transferring the skills they learnt onto the mural. Workshop participants developed skills in design, drawing, painting, and mural methodology. The community of Bunbury came together for the unveiling of the mural.



Skate Screen Workshop presented by Drug Aware

The Dalyellup Street Party will be held during Youth Week in 2022. It will bring a diverse and mulitcultural community together to support and inspire young people to participate in a variety of art workshops including painting, gardening, circus, photography and upcycled fashion. Local food trucks and markets featuring local artists will also be included as part of the celebrations.

Old Doc's Revival: Drug Aware Activation

Coordinated by Darcy Palladino and Mokai Parmenter \$3,939 | South West | Auspiced by Arts Margaret River

Young people will participate in a series of murals to reactivate La Colmena Hostel with visual artist Mokai Parmenter. The project provides a platform for emerging artists to develop their skill set where they will learn the creative process of mural designs, painting and drawing skills.



Next Level YCulture Regional

Presented by Drug Aware

The Next Level Regional Grant program supports young, emerging regional artists and arts workers, aged between 18 and 26, to undertake a self-directed program which builds their capacity to develop and sustain a creative career in regional WA

This can include, but is not limited to, the creation of new work, collaborations, professional development, and training. Five applicants were supported in their individual projects.

Emerging artist manager and events coordinator, Niamh Hurley (22) will develop and implement a music development program for young musicians and artists through a writer's camp where they will be able write and record a song. The writer's camp is part of a mini festival which will include a lineup of local bands, live painters, and mental health workshops.

Emerging sound and lighting technician, Megan Lemon (24) will be mentored by Esperance-based theatre technician Timothy Currie to develop skills and knowledge in operating sound and lighting equipment to support touring shows in numerous venues across regional locations. Megan will also attend the 2022 Tech West conference to build networks with technicians across WA and to learn more about different lighting and sound equipment.

Rose Barton | Dampier | \$7,500

Emerging artist and curator, Rose Barton (25) will undertake a mentorship with regional artist Ruth Halbert to explore together the psychological and political facets of social connection, human relationships, and how these relate to the individual self. The project will enable Rose to expand her practice into digital, sculptural, and written form, which will culminate in her first solo exhibition at the Cossack Gallery in the Pilbara region.

Brooke Collard | Broome | \$7.500

Filmmaker Brooke Collard (25) will collaborate with respected Noongar Elder Pop Koordah, in the development of a documentary Journey Back to Mogumber, which will contribute to an enhanced understanding of her own Noongar heritage and influence future film work that she creates.

Codee-Lee Down | Eaton | \$7,500

Musician, Codee-Lee Down (26) will co-write two songs with US singer songwriter Katrina Burgoyne, and work with a range of established WA based music professionals, which will result in the songs being released commercially to online digital platforms, radio and an EP launch. Codee-Lee will also undertake online training in digital media content development and distribution, which will assist to raise her online profile.

Regional Arts WA delivers tours to Christmas and Cocos (Keeling) Islands on behalf of the Australian Government through the Federal Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications and the State Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries.

Family Shoveller Band toured to both Cocos Islands and Christmas delivering four performances and ten workshops across 15 days. Hailing from the remote Aboriginal community of Bidyadanga, south of Broome, Family Shoveller Band perform a unique blend of reggae, pop, rock and contemporary tunes.

They shared songs in both Karajarri language and English, and shared stories of their culture and life on the land with the communities of the Indian Ocean Territories, some of whom had never had the chance to learn about Aboriginal Australian culture before. The performances attracted 890 audience members on Christmas Island and Cocos (Keeling) Islands.


