Welcome

Donna & David Ronan | Welcome to Country

Donna is a Wilunyu Nhanagardi Wajarri woman, with a deep connection to Country. On her father's side, her ties are to the Geraldton area, while on her mother's side, they are to Byro and Wooleen Country, northeast of Mullewa.

Her ancestral and cultural knowledge has been passed down by Elders of the Amangu Group, who have entrusted her with delivering the Welcome to Country in the local Wilunyu language. This language is at risk of being lost, making its preservation and transmission to future generations crucial.



Rosie Sitorus | MC Board Member, Regional Arts WA



Rosie Sitorus has lived regionally since moving to Geraldton in 2013, where she worked primarily with Aboriginal people in the Midwest-Gascoyne region to record and share languages for ten years. Now based in Karratha and working with the PKKP peoples to establish their languages program, she has made her life in regional Western Australia.

Rosie is an artist who has been building her regional practice and networks since attending the 2014 Regional Arts Australia summit. This led to collaborations, including the theatrecabaret show Fat Girls in Bike Shorts. She is also a singer-songwriter and storyteller, working with Thiinma Elder Peter Salmon since 2017 to record his languages, write songs, and share his life story through their band Warralgurniya.

Introduction

Oliver Bazzani | Introduction Chairperson, Regional Arts WA

Oliver is a founder, director, and consultant, with almost a decade's experience working across innovation, strategy, and investment. On this journey, he's worn multiple hats spanning the not-for-profit, government, and corporate sectors.

Notable projects include creating a Creative Arts Hub in the Peel Region, managing a leading youth arts festival, and developing a program for regional musicians to perform at a National Music Festival.

Dr Charmaine Papertalk Green Creative Ecology Activation: A Midwest Transformative Yamaji Narrative

Born in Eradu, Charmaine is a proud Wajarri, Badimaya and Wilunyu woman of the Yamaji Nation. A visual artist, author, poet, storyteller and social science researcher, she shares her cultural knowledge in many different spheres.

Charmaine has written five books, won several awards including the prestigious Australian Literary Society Gold Medal, and her poetry is studied as part of primary and school curriculum. Charmaine was awarded her PhD in 2022 through Edith Cowan University. She has been involved with the Yamatji Art Centre in Geraldton for over 22 years, she is currently their chairperson.

Charmaine was awarded the 2022 Magabala Fellowship and 2023 Red Room Poetry Fellowship and is a member of the national First Nation Aboriginal Writers Network and inductee into the WA Women's Hall of Fame.

Creative Ecology

Dr Vahri McKenzie & Dr Christine Scoggin Creative Ecologies: Making More With a Metaphor

Vahri is an educator, artist and scholar whose work frames creative engagement as a model of, and practice for, ways of being together in a complex world. She is WAAPA's Arts and Cultural Management Course Coordinator.

Chris is a community development professional with over 20 years' experience working with organisations to help them improve their social and economic standing through capacity building, stakeholder engagement, and leadership development. She manages WAAPA student work placements for ACM.

Lucia Richardson Aboriginal Acrobat - Lifting the Bar

Lucia Richardson is an Amangu young person from the Yamaji nation. At only 17 years old, the Jambinu raised teen already has extensive (and impressive) experience in the performing arts space. Within her first year of joining Australia's only National Youth Circus (Flying Fruit Fly Circus) she performed at the Sydney Opera House twice a day for two weeks for their 50th anniversary.

Of the 80 student cohort at the National Youth Circus, Lucia is the only Aboriginal student and feels the effects of cultural and familial isolation. Lucia is in her final year with the National Youth Circus and aims to train abroad in 2026 and to be the first Yamaji circus performer to be cast internationally.

Roni Kerley Ancient Skies Linking us to Modern Times

Roni Kerley is a Menang Ngadju Noongar woman currently living in Geraldton. Roni was born in Wyndham, spent most her childhood in Port Hedland, before moving to Geraldton as teenager in the mid 90's. The last 8.5 years has seen Roni take on the role of Manager at Yamaji Art, leading the way in ensuring the organisation continues to grow and expand its footprint within the Aboriginal visual art sector across the Midwest.

Mauretta Drage, Colleen Drage & Marina Baker Small Art Centre, Big Country: The Successes and Challenges of a Small Aboriginal Art Centre in WA's Mid West

Ku'arlu Mangga (Good Nest) is a regional Aboriginal Art centre based in Mooniemia/Northampton with an artists' workshop, art gallery and online shop. It is a not-for-profit, community-based organisation with AACHWA membership and local engagement.

Mauretta Drage is the Gallery Officer working with Gallery Manager Marina Baker to generate new artwork, organise workshops, and grow exhibition management, sales and developing opportunities for member artists.

Helen Ansell Wildflowers & Wild Landscapes: An Artist's Life in Regional Western Australia

Helen Ansell, based in Mullewa, Western Australia, is a celebrated artist known for her vibrant acrylic paintings inspired by the region's flora and fauna.

Raised in the remote Aboriginal community of Ululla, and influenced by her father, Don Miller, a passionate expert in Australian botany, her work reflects a deep connection to the desert landscapes and cultural heritage of central WA.

From her internationally acclaimed Studio Gallery in Mullewa, she showcases her art while contributing to the region through public projects and exhibitions.



Emmaline James Geraldton Open Studios & Surrounds: A Catalyst For Arts & Cultural Tourism in the Mid West



Emmaline is the Co-Founder and Project Manager of Geraldton Open Studios & Surrounds (GOSS), a cultural tourism initiative showcasing the talents of Mid West visual artists.

Since its 2023 pilot, GOSS has connected communities and visitors with the region's creative energy. With a background in arts project management, Emmaline is passionate about supporting regional artists and promoting cultural tourism.

James Thompson Why Geraldton & the Mid West is a Great Place to Live and be Creative!

James Thompson is a Geraldton-based arts worker who became deeply involved in the local arts scene after arriving in 1997. He has played a key role in initiatives like the Nukara Music Festival, various community events, and promoting original live music. Alongside his arts contributions, James runs a gardening business and works parttime at the Museum of Geraldton, while supporting musicians through his role on the Regional Sounds board.

Marianne Penberthy When Art and Life Collide: A Journey Through Creative Practice

Marianne Penberthy is an award-winning textile artist living in Geraldton Western Australia. Born in Brisbane, Queensland in 1948, Marianne embarked on her artistic journey in the early eighties as a self-taught ceramicist.



Pursuing formal training at the Midwest TAFE and Edith Cowan University Perth, she completed her visual arts degree in 1996. Marianne's work has been showcased across Western Australia, interstate, and internationally, exhibiting in South Korea and Fibre Arts International USA. Her work is deeply influenced by unique vegetation, remnants of habitation, mapping, and the language of the land she now calls home.

The Auger Green Collective is an informal group of artists and makers which emerged in response to the Geraldton Regional Art Gallery's (GRAG) call for group participation in the IOTA21 exhibition.

Pia Boschetti, known as The Girl Who Grows the Pearl at the Abrolhos Islands, is a passionate pearl farmer and owner of Latitude Jewellers. She has dedicated her career to cultivating pearls that reflect the beauty of Western Australia. 14 years ago, Pia founded the Flotsam and Jetsam exhibition, a project that celebrates art created from marine debris collected at the Abrolhos Islands. This exhibition highlights the importance of environmental stewardship while showcasing the creative talent of local artists.


